



Antarctic Weather Stations Expedition

Mr. Beckendorf and the team will be deploying, supporting, and maintaining a network of instruments that take automated weather measurements throughout the year.

Since the beginning of the project in 1980, there have been approximately 100 weather stations deployed across Antarctica

The data are transmitted via satellite in real-time and are a very important part of many scientific projects taking place in Antarctica, as these stations provide the only weather measurements available on most parts of the continent.






Political Map of the World, April 2006












